


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Principal's Message

The Principal's Message for March is being brought to you by Associate Principal, Mr. Aaron Skretting. Enjoy this reflection on the Lenten Season.

In 1733 Alexander Pope published his collection An Essay on Man. It is from this collection that we have derived today the popular phrase 'hope springs eternal'. As we enter the final stretch of the school year, concluding quarter three and beginning quarter four, we also enter the Easter season. It is during this season that we can again point to both the crucifix and the empty tomb as reminders that hope does indeed spring eternal thanks to the Easter miracle. Alleluia, He is risen!



In this time, as the weather improves and we see the signals of new life abound, I would like to take this opportunity to review some data that we collected from our students in the dark midwinter days of at-home learning. In December of 2020, students were asked to complete the Our School Survey, which consists of a series of questions about the entirety of their school experience. As we reviewed this data with our central office personnel recently, two items popped out.

First, students were asked to assess their own feelings about COVID and its impact on their mental health and schooling. 90% of our students responded from neutral to positive, including the following breakdown:

- 57% say that the pandemic has changed their life, but they have adjusted;
- 19% say that the pandemic has not changed their life;
- 14% say that they are *positive and hopeful*, and that the pandemic can change us for the better.




Second, students were asked to assess the school culture in a variety of areas. While all areas were well represented in their scores, 80% of our students agreed with the statement that our school is *faith-filled*. At our recent Spiritual Development Day on March 22, we were reminded by our keynote speaker David Wells that we must allow ourselves to be interrupted by God in the midst of our busyness and planning. It is in these interruptions, because we are forced to stop, that we can encounter ourselves and God - and perhaps, this is what we are seeing manifested for our students in the reality behind these statistics.



To me, as a leader in the school, it is truly heartening to see these results from our reaffirms students. and that what we do here is good, and what we do here is important. We know that it has been an incredibly hard year in so many ways for our students, and the year is not over yet. However, we must not lose heart in the face of continued challenges. Imagine how the Apostles must have felt in the hours between Holy Thursday and Easter morning - saddened, grieving,

worried, confused, disoriented, anxious. These emotions, so familiar to us this year, were overcome in three days as Christ rose from the dead, turning the cross from a symbol of Roman authority to one of eternal hope. We believe that eternal life is the fruit of the Crucifixion, and therefore as an Easter people, each spring our hope is renewed. As our calendars turn to April, let us again put into perspective the challenges that we have faced so far this year, and to look forward into quarter four with the promise of better days to come (both in this life and the next).




From March 25-April 23, 2021, Alberta Education will be conducting the annual AEA Survey. The LAST DAY for all survey submissions is April 23, 2021.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with your school. In addition to English and French, the parent survey is available in Chinese, Punjabi, Arabic, Blackfoot, Dene, Cree, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog and Urdu.

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly. Additionally, please be advised that any question that you answer "I don't know to" will have a negative impact so try to answer to the best of your knowledge.

Survey results will be reported publicly as part of their 3-Year Education Plans and Annual Education Results Reports.

GRAD FEES:

• Grad fees for 2021 include the following: grad photo sitting fee, individual convocation photo, cap and tassel, facility rental (Enmax), diploma covers and grad boxes, as well as live-streaming production services (Feature Productions) of the ceremonies. The fee per student is \$55 and can be paid through SchoolCash Online.

- •Please note: There will be no Grad Fee refunds unless Catholic Central High School cancels the event entirely.

Call for Audit Committee Public Members

The Holy Spirit Roman Catholic Separate School Division is requesting applications from members of the public to fill two (2) positions on the school division's Audit Committee as public members.

Under the new *Education Act*, the school division's Audit Committee is to be comprised of three (3) trustees and two (2) members of the public.

The Committee will be responsible for:

- recommending external auditors to the Board;
- reviewing the annual financial statements and reporting to the Board; and
- ensuring appropriate internal controls exist and are maintained.

Qualifications for the public members:

- Ideally have financial experience and/or a professional accounting designation;
- Independent to the school division; and
- No financial or personal interests with the school division's audit firm, KPMG.

Public members will be compensated for their time on the Audit Committee, as per <u>Board Policy 18</u>, <u>Appendix A: Trustee Compensation, Allowances and Reimbursement Rates</u>. Be Grateful

We have discovered, especially this year, how important it is to be gentle with each other. Today, we engage so much in the digital world. Because of this, it is important that we teach children to be just as empathetic with the person they are interacting with online as they are with a friend sitting beside them in their classroom.

In the 2020 edition of The Catholic Perspective, the Institute for Catholic Education highlighted the life of Carlo Acutis. As they shared in this article, there are many young people who give wonderful witness to how to be empathetic in their online interactions, using the power of media for good. They noted, "The Holy Father offers the example of the newly beatified Carlo Acutis as a digital witness for young people. Carlo is being called a #DigitalDisciple and #CyberApostle for the way he witnessed to his devotion to the Eucharist in his online work...He created a website that gathered and shared information about Eucharistic miracles..."

"The Church recognizes the importance of digital culture, especially in the lives of young people." We are grateful that we have the gift of technology and our prayer is that we use it to help to share the Good News. "In our Catholic schools we are teaching our students that we don't equate faith in Jesus with the culture of 'influencers' and 'followers'", but to discover their own life in the context of their community of faith. (Institute for Catholic Education) Let us give thanks that we have good and holy people showing us the way to live good and holy lives - in person and online!



All students in Alberta learn about digital citizenship but in our Catholic schools, digital citizenship is taught through the Catholic perspective which is always about maintaining and promoting the dignity of the human person. It is so important to teach our children how to be empathetic as they are learning to use digital media. We teach our students how to ensure their digital footprint is one in which they maintain their own dignity as well as the dignity of those with whom they are communicating.

This <u>document</u> created by the Institute for Catholic Education in Ontario is very much in line with what is happening each day in our Alberta Catholic schools too. Perhaps some of the items on this poster might be helpful to you as you work with your child's school to teach digital citizenship at home too.

Pope Francis offers this encouragement to young people: "You can become what God your Creator knows you are, if only you realize that you are called to something greater. Ask the help of the Holy Spirit and confidently aim for the great goal of holiness. In this way,...you will be fully yourself."
