November: Academic achievements were celebrated at our annual Awards Night and JV Girls Volleyball ended their season with a GOLD medal win over Magrath. The Santa's Anonymous group raised \$2000 through their 24 hour famine and CCH SV Boys and Girls were the most gracious host for 4A Volleyball Provincials.



December: Run throughs for *The Addams Family* began and heavy lifting the organization and distribution of hampers for Santa's Anonymous began. Oh, and with cross country, volleyball, and football, seasons over, basketball and curling seasons were in full force. We also took some time to rejoice and celebrate the coming of the Lord with our Christmas Cheer Concert!



January: We began the new year posting some tournament wins and bringing half the school years to a close. Our grade 12 French Immersion students were recognized for having completed 13 years of French Immersion Programming! Felicitations!





February: We saw the start to badminton season and INTENSE run throughs for *The Addams Family*, while the curling season came to an end.

Additionally, the Robotics Team headed to the VEX Robotics competition in Calgary where they competed against giants in the robotic world but were recognized by many for being an “up and coming team” in the field.

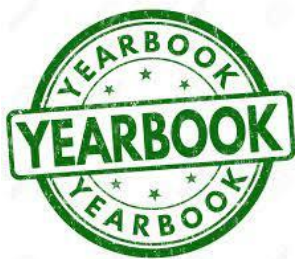
All School Fees are now past-due and payable on School Cash Online. Please take a moment to check your student's account and ensure all fees for the 2022-2023 year have been paid!



On May 16, 2023, Lethbridge City Council Tuesday voted unanimously in favour to approve the implementation of harmonized school and playground zones. For more information, please see the City of Lethbridge's release, "[Safety top priority as Council approves speed zone harmonization.](#)"

This change will come into effect for the 2023/2024 school year and will see all current playground and school zones have a cohesive 30 km/hr speed limit from 7:30 am to 9:00 p.m. every day of the year.

The school division agrees that this decision will make the traffic laws easier for motorists to remember, as well as ensure the safety of all children accessing school and city playgrounds.

Graduates will be receiving (by mail from LifeTouch) a Graduation class photo and the individual picture that was taken as you received your diploma at the Convocation ceremony.

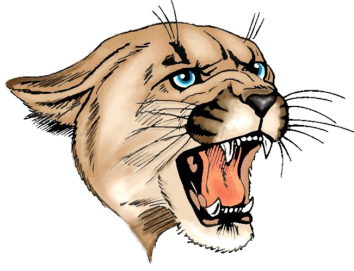

If your student is not returning to Holy Spirit schools in the fall, please fill out the form and indicate if your student will not be returning. If you have trouble accessing PowerSchool, please contact the school office for assistance.

CCHS Co-curricular Spring Update



To say that the CCHS spring season of athletics was busy would be an understatement! More than 175 athletes participated in the sporting programs starting in March and ending in June. A large number of personal and team bests were achieved, and many athletes had a tremendous amount of fun participating.

The Baseball team finally experienced an entire season not interrupted by COVID or other issues. They drew from grades 9 -12 and played some of the best players within their age groups in Southern Alberta. They currently sit in the top bracket as they prepare for upcoming playdowns later this week. They are a deep bunch who pride themselves on team unity and skill depth.

The Softball program decided to go with a JV and Varsity squad this year as there was such a huge demand this season. Like the baseball players, the softball girls' have challenged the best of the best in the South and have played many games. With development being their primary goal, their season has seen some wins and losses, but learning the game and having fun was achieved.

The CCH Track and Field team has practiced hard at the U of L over the last few months, and it showed. The results from cities and Zones were very commendable. Many of our athletes made it to the podiums and broke their personal best records. Six athletes even reached the pinnacle of their categories by obtaining invites to ASAA Provincials, which take place June 1st and 2nd in Edmonton. We wish these athletes good luck as they compete against the best in Alberta.

The Girls Rugby XV's squad has respectfully turned many heads as they entered a squad into the SAHSRL this season. Not having a CCH team for nearly 13 years had this group starting from nearly scratch. Most of the girls had no previous experience in rugby, but with a keen and experienced group of coaches, the JV and Varsity girls saw more wins than losses throughout the season. They practiced five days a week and had their opponents on notice in just a short time. Hopefully, with a critical win on May 31st, they might see an ASAA postseason berth which will be a first in school history.



The Boys' JV and Varsity Sevens teams, like the girls, had started from scratch this season after a 20-year hiatus. Players from ICS, Raymond, and our feeder Jr High schools helped fill out the rosters. This dedicated bunch began the season with a gold medal and two silver medals in consecutive tournaments. Trips to Drayton Valley and Vulcan helped focus the boys on their attainable goals. At the end of May, the 7s team was granted an ASAA berth as Zone winners to represent the South Zone at Provincials. In that tournament, they faced the best of the best and came home with the first Provincial BRONZE medal by a CCHS Rugby team. The coaches, players, and parents were delighted by the result. The Cougars are already looking forward to next season and a chance to better themselves on the big stage. Great job, Fellas!

All in all, the Spring season was an excellent way to end the 2022-23 CCHS Athletic Season! Our athletes learned a great deal, had a ton of fun and most importantly grew from their experiences.

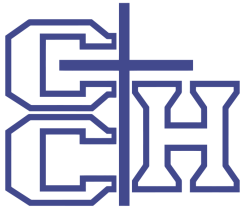
September 1 - Administrative Team and Guidance Counselors will be present on both Campus East and Campus West for timetable changes from 8:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m.

PARENTS AND STUDENTS OF HOLY SPIRIT SCHOOL DISTRICT

You and your families are invited to join us on this special day to walk in a procession as we bring the Holy Eucharist to the streets of Lethbridge.

This is a great way for the children and their families to profess their faith and belief in the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord, Jesus Christ. For many of us our memories of the special times in our church life are what helps keep our gift of faith during the times when we find it challenging. This is one of those occasions and this is our wish for you.

It is suggested that we wear white, or red (second choice) which represents the Body or the Blood of Christ. School students are invited to wear any clothing that represents their CATHOLIC schools. Younger children and Elementary school age children must be accompanied by a parent(s).

The procession is a reverent and respectful procession with joyful song and prayer as we process with the Monstrance we show our adoration for the Body of Christ in the Eucharist.

We leave from St. Basil's at 12 noon, after the 11:00 am Mass. The Eucharist is placed in the Monstrance, and then on the carrier. Those wishing to walk follow the procession moving south on 13th Street with a prayer stop at the corner of 2nd Avenue before continuing to CCH. You are invited to take turns carrying the carrier.

At Our Lady of Assumption procession begins with a prayer service at 11:45 am. Once the Monstrance is on the carrier we walk east to Mayor Magrath Drive, where we turn north. After a prayer stop at 8th Avenue we continue walking along Mayor Magrath to 6th Avenue, then we turn left and continue walking to 20th Street. We turn right at Ecole St. Mary's and continue until we reach CCH field.

You are invited to walk with us all the way (with the prayer stop it will take about 1 hour), or join us at one of the prayer stations. If you cannot walk join us at Catholic Central High School, East campus on the field.

At CCH we will have Benediction on the field, weather permitting. In bad weather we will gather in the cafeteria. This will be followed by a social lunch and fun activities for the younger people.

There are three major processions in the life of the church, including Corpus Christi: the Sunday after Trinity Sunday when we remember the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper, Holy Thursday. A prominent aspect of this feast is the procession which is to follow the Mass... The procession should be seen as a public declaration of the parish community's faith.....Processions are a very important part of our Catholic identity. We are a pilgrim people on a journey, a journey of growth in faith and self-awareness. We are called to be followers of Jesus, to walk with Him.

Saint Maximilian Kolbe 1894-1941 (Feast Day: August 14)

Raymund Kolbe was born in Poland in 1894. At the age of 12, while praying with an image of Our Lady of Czestochowa, Mary appeared to him in a vision. He later joined a branch of the Franciscan order, and took the name Maximilian as his religious name when he was ordained. In the early 1930s, he served as a missionary in Shanghai, Nagasaki, and Malabar. The monastery which he built in his time in Nagasaki later survived the atomic bomb blast.

Kolbe returned to Poland in 1936, resumed his work as a priest and publisher, and started a Catholic radio station. At the outbreak of the Second World War in 1939, Kolbe and his fellow friars provided shelter to Jewish refugees, and continued publishing Catholic and anti-Nazi works. Kolbe was arrested in February 1941, and was eventually sent to Auschwitz. He maintained his priestly ministry in the camp, which led to beatings and punishments.

In late July 1941, after the escape of a prisoner from the camp, ten men were selected to be starved to death as punishment. One of the men selected was a Polish army sergeant named Franciszek Gajowniczek; when selected, he cried out for his wife and family. At this point, Kolbe stepped forward to take his place voluntarily. Gajowniczek survived the war and lived until 1996.

The prisoners were jailed in an underground bunker and deprived of food and water. During this time, Kolbe led the group in prayer. After two weeks, only Kolbe and three others remained alive. On August 14, 1941, he and the other three prisoners were killed with a lethal injection.



Holy Moments In Our Schools

Over the course of this year, we have been blessed to see the many Holy Moments that have happened throughout Holy Spirit. When we take time to step back and reflect on these moments, we often discern the role that the Holy Spirit plays in our lives to reveal God and his plan to us. As you have each taken up the call to Arise this year, like the École St. Mary students shown here, you too have been a conduit for the Holy Spirit for those around you.



June – Comfort the Afflicted

Comforting the afflicted (or sometimes, the sorrowful), is the last of the Spiritual Works of Mercy that we will examine this year. This comfort is not a corporal (physical) work of mercy because it is describing the need that we have to support one another emotionally and spiritually. If we consider the roots of the word comfort, we find together (com-) and strong (-fort); strong together. We see something similar in the word compassion—suffering together. When we find ways to suffer with one another—to bear each other’s burdens—we become stronger and more unified. That strength and unity is modeled in a perfect way in Christ, who took on all of our burdens and suffered for us, that we might become one. “It is not a sign of weakness to share your suffering with someone. In fact, it takes great courage and it takes even more courage to listen and not try to solve the problem. Sometimes we just need to “suffer with” that person in order to comfort them.”

Be open to listening and comforting those who are dealing with grief. Even if we aren’t sure of the right words to say, our presence can make a big difference.

- Lend a listening ear to those going through a tough time
- Make a home cooked meal for a friend who is facing a difficult time
- Write a letter or send a card to someone who is suffering
- A few moments of your day may make a lifetime of difference to someone who is going through a difficult time

The Fruit of the Spirit – Love

Love is both a Fruit of the Spirit and one of the three *Theological Virtues* inspired by the Holy Spirit. As the first and greatest Theological Virtue, Love (or Charity) refers to our ability to love God above all things, and our neighbour as ourself. Our imperfect love is a reflection of the perfect love that God has for us, and the love that exists in the relationship between God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. This points us toward the idea that love is relational, and the fullness of love leads us into communion and spiritual unity with God and one another. Throughout this year, we have focused on this element of Mark 5 of the Catholic School Identity - that we live in community, spiritual unity, and relationship.

God demonstrates His perfect, selfless, agape love to a world that is often confused about what true love is. In society, we have overused the word ‘love’ in ways that minimize the depth of what real love is. We say we “loved the movie” or we “loved those blueberry pancakes” or we “love” a Facebook post.

Jesus used the word ‘love’ 51 times during his teaching. In John 15:17, he used the word ‘love’ in a command, “These things I command you, that you love one another.” As a child of God, we need to strive to show others God’s love through us. Whether it be reaching out to a friend in need, volunteering in a mission, giving our time to a cause—reach out in love, and let the fruit of love ripen inside your spirit.

Reflecting on the life of St. Maximilian Kolbe ...

Saint Maximilian Kolbe Showed “Comfort the Afflicted”

As we have seen, we can draw a connection between comforting the afflicted and suffering together. In his final days, St. Maximilian Kolbe chose to suffer together with his fellow prisoners, and continued to point them towards Christ even in their unimaginable circumstances. In his collected writings, he once said:

“A person is great and becomes a witness and a teacher, capable of leaving an authentic message to the world, not so much on account of what one says or writes, but for what one is...”

Although St. Maximilian Kolbe died at Auschwitz, he left an authentic message to the world. The man he saved, Franciszek Gajowniczek, survived the remainder of the war and was reunited with his wife, and spent his life spreading the story of Kolbe's sacrifice.

Saint Maximilian Kolbe Showed “Love”

When St. Maximilian Kolbe was canonized by St. Pope John Paul II, he was decreed to be a martyr of charity. In the Catholic tradition, this is someone who is martyred in the act of practicing charity motivated by faith. In this alone, it is clear that Kolbe was a model of love.

One saying that was often repeated by Kolbe in his life and work was “only Love creates.” The meaning of this, so evident not only in World War II but also in our own day, is that hatred is not a creative force - all that is created is a reflection of the love that God has for us. In the crucible of Auschwitz, founded in hatred, Kolbe chose to witness his faith by laying down his life for a man that he did not know. Such a decision could only be made in the knowledge that this loving choice would have creative ends in God's plan. As St. Pope John Paul II said at his canonization:

“And in this human death of his there was the clear witness borne to Christ: the witness borne in Christ to the dignity of man, to the sanctity of his life, and to the saving power of death in which the power of love is made manifest.”

Gospel Readings

June 4, 2023

Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Gospel Reading: John 3:16-18

“God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.” — John 3:16

What is the most precious thing you have? Is it a special toy? A special friendship? A special talent? Would you be willing to give it to someone else if that person needed it? There is nothing more precious than life itself. But God was willing to send Jesus into our world for our benefit.

On this special feast day, we remember that while God is one, God is also a family of three Persons – Father, Son and Holy Spirit, bound together as one by a great force of love. The amazing thing is that Father, Son and Holy Spirit love us with the same great love. There is nothing more important to God than to bring us into their family of love.

Dear Lord, thank you for loving us with such a great love that even death cannot separate us. Help us to sacrifice the little things we hold onto so we can imitate your love to others and bring them closer to you.

What is one thing you can give up today that will help someone else?

June 11, 2023

Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ

Gospel Reading: John 6:51-58

“Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.” — John 6:56

What happens when you dissolve a powdered drink mix in water and shake it up? Would it be possible to separate the granules from the water once they are completely dissolved? Of course not! Our Gospel passage today reminds us that when we receive Jesus' Body and Blood in Holy Communion, he becomes a part of us, and we are changed to become more like him. Last week, we learned that God's love for us is so great that Christ was willing to die so we might be brought into the family of God. This week, we see that not only do we become a part of God's family through Jesus' death and resurrection, but Jesus went even a step further by providing a way for us to have his Body and Blood poured into us. He wants so much to be a part of us that he gives us himself in this new way. We are blessed to have an opportunity to receive him in Holy Communion.

Thank you, Jesus, for offering us your Body and Blood so that your life can become our life. Help us to prepare well to receive you in Holy Communion so we will welcome you with a clean heart.

What will you say to Jesus after receiving him in Holy Communion today? (For those who have not yet received their First Holy Communion, you can still talk to him in prayer during the communion procession.)

June 18, 2023

11th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 9:36-10:8

“Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give.”
— Matthew 10:8

Have you even received advertising mail that contained a quarter or even a dollar? The advertiser usually suggests that you donate the money back to their cause. I wonder how many people do that. I think most people feel that since they didn't ask for the money, and the advertiser chose to give it to them, they don't owe the advertiser anything back.

In today's Gospel, Jesus called his apostles by name and gave them a very important opportunity—not because they did something to earn it, but because he believed they would use the opportunity to help others believe that God loves them. Jesus told them to go out into the world and tell God's people about the kingdom he prepared for them. Even more than telling them, they were to show them how it works in this kingdom of his. How? By taking care of them for free. They cured their illnesses, brought the dead back to life, and drove out evil spirits. Many people came to believe in Jesus because of the generous acts of his apostles.

Dear Lord, help us to be so generous as to share your love with others, not for what we will get in return but because we want to return what you have given us—your love.

What is one thing you can do to help people know that God loves them?

June 25, 2023

12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Matthew 10:26-33

“What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light; what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops.” — Matthew 10:27

Have you ever had a dream that seemed so real that when you awoke you thought the events had actually happened? Many times in the Bible we read that God spoke to people in dreams. God can also speak to us in other ways besides dreams. The Gospel today says that God may sometimes speak to us quietly. If we suddenly have a sense that we should or shouldn't do something, God may be prompting us to do the right thing. Or, if we are reading a story and all-of-a-sudden it reminds us of someone who needs our help, God may be asking us to share God's love with that person. The key to hearing God is to listen carefully. We cannot tell others what God has told us if we didn't hear him, can we?

Lord Jesus, open my eyes so I may see clearly; open my ears so I may hear you and help others to know you.

After Mass today, take a few moments together to sit silently and listen. What do you hear? Is it hard not to talk, just to sit quietly? It may take some practice, but it's worth the effort if it helps us to hear God's voice.
