

New Policy for Borrowing Materials

This year Catholic Central High School instituted a policy to assist us in the return of materials borrowed during the school year. This system will benefit the school, in particular the library, as it has suffered real loss in the past with library books and textbooks not being returned or damaged, which have to be replaced.

This also reminds students of what materials they have borrowed that must be returned.

A caution fee of between \$80 and \$140 has been added to your school fees. Should something not be returned, it will be taken off this fee. If the caution fee is insufficient, the student will be billed for the balance. All materials will have to be returned in good condition or the fee will be implemented. If all materials are returned, the caution fee will be refunded at the end of the school year.

If you have library books, textbooks, calculators or other school materials and you are no longer using them, please return them to the school as soon as possible.

Note: We take every measure to ensure that the item signed out to you was indeed signed out to you. Please take care of these materials so that we can pass them on to other students in good condition.

Work Experience

Work Experience is a program designed to create an opportunity for students to earn high school credits and experience the World of Work first hand. Students may be in a paid or a volunteer position. Students can earn up to 15 credits towards their High School Diploma. All students must have complete the HCS 3000 Workplace Safety **Systems course** before starting work experience and complete the Off-Campus Work Agreement form and return it **BEFORE** hours of work will start to be accumulated. Students are responsible for finding their own positions.

Earn while you learn!



Green Certificate Program

This program is a joint endeavor between Alberta Education and Alberta Agriculture and Forestry. Participants learn by actively performing the skills required under the direction of experienced farm personal and provides students with credentials that could lead to a career in agribusiness. Students must complete the AGR3000 Agriculture Safety course before starting the course. Students can earn up to 16 credits towards their High School Diploma. Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP)

This program provides senior high school students the opportunity to earn credits in high school and gain on-the-job training that can be applied towards an apprenticeship. Students can earn up to 40 credits towards their High School Diploma. All students must have complete the HCS 3000 Workplace Safety Systems course before starting the program and be paid at least minimum wage for their work. RAP students will also receive their Apprenticeship Blue Book.

Dual Credit - In Partnership with Olds College and Lethbridge College

Dual Credit courses are an opportunity for high school students to explore career pathways, post-secondary opportunities, get a head start on post-secondary diploma programs and ease transition from high school to post-secondary while still enrolled in high school. Students will earn credits in both high school & post-secondary at the same time. There are no tuition fees for post-secondary courses completed during high school.

Special Projects

Special Projects are projects that students can purse in which they have considerable interest or ability but which are not within the scope of the regular curriculum. Students can earn up to 15 credits towards their Diploma.

Dear Parents.

Another school year has started and as Alberta's new Minister of Education, I want to introduce myself and give you a quick update about some of the things your government has been doing to ensure our students are set up for success.

A top priority for my parents was getting me a high-quality education, since I'm a second generation Calgarian. Having immigrated to Calgary in the 1970s their educational opportunities were limited, and they firmly believed that a strong education is the path to greater success and prosperity. I took their advice to heart and went on to earn my PhD in political science and conflict resolution. I'm passionate about education and will work hard to set our students up for success.

As the 2023/24 school year gets underway there are several important highlights I want to share with you.

I firmly believe that the upcoming school year will give students the tools and resources they need to succeed.

Here are some of the things that we are working on:

1) We are injecting new funding to start the school year off on the right foot.

For the current school year, Alberta's government has increased funding to many of our school divisions to make sure they have the financial resources they need to give our kids a world-class education. Funding has increased by seven per cent from last year increasing the total amount of taxpayer dollars going directly to our school divisions to \$7.4 billion. In addition, a new Classroom Complexity Grant will be implemented which provides \$126 million over three years in new funding to help school authorities hire more educational assistants to help our teachers manage classrooms that are increasingly more complex with more students with diverse learning needs. As well, our hardworking teachers will also receive a two per cent salary increase this September as part of a deal reached with teachers last year and finally, we are providing \$414 million in new funding, a 32 per cent increase, to help bus another 80,000 students to school.

2) We are hiring more teachers and staff in our classrooms.

As students head back to class, they may start to see new friendly faces in their school. Budget 2023 provided funding to hire up to 3,000 new educational staff over three years, including teachers, educational assistants, bus drivers and other school support staff such as speech language pathologists and psychologists. Ensuring students have the supports they need to succeed in and out of the classroom is a top priority of mine.

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3) We are focused on improving student mental health.

Alberta's government is supporting almost 80 mental health pilot projects across the province, with an investment of \$50 million. These projects will encourage student well-being through new and innovative approaches to providing supports and services like counselling, social and emotional learning, student assessment and training for school staff. 4) We will continue to lead the country in early literacy and numeracy assessments.

As a father of two, I want to know how my girls are progressing in their academic journey and I know many of you want the same. In September of 2022, Alberta's government implemented new mandatory literacy and numeracy screening assessments for all students in Grades 1 – 3. These assessments will help identify students who are struggling with literacy and numeracy skill development and inform teacher intervention lesson plans and techniques to improve student skills. Based on school reporting, these interventions are working. I am very proud of the work that is being done here. Please know Alberta is leading the country with this type of early assessment and screening and will continue to foster new and improved ways to improve the education system. In closing, I want to thank and acknowledge all our hardworking teachers, educational assistants, principals, and other school support staff. The work that you do is deeply acknowledged and appreciated by Alberta's government and I want to express my personal appreciation for your work. I look forward to serving as our province's Minister of Education for our great province and am confident we can continue to provide every student with a world-class education.

Build!

Pilgrims of Hope



St. Vincent de Paul was born in France in 1581, and lived in the countryside with his family until the age of 15, when he entered the seminary to train as a priest. He didn't start out intending to become a great saint; in fact, it took him quite a while to figure out how to really live out his vocation. Over time, his heart was changed and became more compassionate towards the poor. Once he began working simply to respond to the basic needs of those around him from a Christian stance, his work blossomed. He worked with the *Daughters of Charity*, a group of lay women who worked extensively with the poor and sick. They collected donations for distribution that created homes for abandoned children, a hospice for the elderly, and freed galley slaves.

He can be a great model for us in our daily lives then, if we are struggling to determine our vocation or to find ways to contribute to the common good. In all of his endeavours, St. Vincent de Paul started by recognizing and promoting the dignity of those around him. This legacy lives on today, in the *Society of St. Vincent de Paul*, founded in 1833 by his followers. This Catholic society is open to all who want to love and serve their neighbour. In Canada the <u>Society of St. Vincent de Paul</u> serves more than 350,000 people each year.



"Building" In Our Schools

Corporal Works of Mercy Shelter the Homeless —

Speaking in Washington, D.C. in 2015, Pope Francis said:

I can imagine Joseph, with his wife about to have a child, with no shelter, no home, no place to stay. The Son of God came into this world as a homeless person. The Son of God knew what it was to start life without a roof over his head. We can imagine what Joseph must have been thinking. How is it that the Son of God has no home? Why are we homeless, why don't we have housing? These are questions which many of you may ask, and do ask, every day. Like Saint Joseph, you may ask: Why are we homeless, without a place to live? And those of us who do have a home, a roof over our heads, would also do well to ask: Why do these, our brothers and sisters, have no place to live? Why are these brothers and sisters of ours homeless?

People experience homelessness for many different reasons. Our faith encourages us to reach out and encounter those without the stability of a home, affirming their human dignity, and assisting them in seeking solutions to the challenges they face.

What might some practical suggestions be?

- help elderly neighbours care for their homes and do repairs
- support and/or volunteer at a homeless shelter
- support and/or volunteer for charitable agencies who care for the homeless, build homes, and provide support in the wake of natural disasters
- · consider becoming a foster parent

Dignity of the Human Person

Through the course of this year, we will look each month at one of the Catholic Social Teachings. The aim of Catholic Social Teaching is to shine the light of the Gospel on our contemporary world, allowing us as disciples of Christ to look at the world around us with new eyes, and to take action.

All of the Catholic Social Teachings are rooted in the inherent dignity of the human person, created in the image and likeness of God. Our belief in the sanctity of human life and inherent dignity are the foundation of our moral vision for society. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes:

"Being in the image of God the human individual possesses the dignity of a person, who is not just something, but someone."

Gospel Reading: Matthew 16:21-27

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:15-20

When we discover someone is doing something wrong, how do we respond? Do we go to him and try to help him improve? Do we talk about him behind his back? Do we just ignore what he's doing and let him get into deeper trouble?

In our Gospel today, Jesus shows us that we have a responsibility to help each other improve. That's hard to do because our good intentions might be seen as butting in when it's not our business. But Jesus reminds us that he will be with us and wants us to care enough to make a difference in other people's lives. If we ask for his help, he will give us the right words to use. We must always speak the truth in love.

Discuss together what loving words you can use to help someone get back on the path to God. Consider times when you were corrected by someone and how you felt.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 18:21-35

"Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him?" — Matthew 18:21

When someone hurts us, it's very common to want revenge. We often feel it's unfair if that person does not experience the same hurt inflicted on us.

In our Gospel today, Jesus tells us that his way is different. Instead of looking for ways to get back at someone, we should remember that Jesus forgave us even when we didn't deserve it. Just before Jesus died on the cross, he said to his Father "Forgive them, for they know not what they are doing." What an example He gave us! Even in the midst of suffering like a criminal, even though he was completely innocent, he forgave not only those who inflicted the pain that day but all people throughout the ages—even us. So, are we to forgive only once in a while? Jesus said there is no limit to the amount of times we should forgive others. For surely he didn't limit his forgiveness of us!

In the Gospel today, we hear a parable about a landowner who pays all his workers the same amount of money, even though they did not all work the same amount of time. We may wonder why Jesus seems to be okay with that—isn't it unfair?

I remember when my son made the basketball team in junior high. Every day after school he and his teammates practiced for two hours. One day, a new student came to his school. The coach wanted him to feel welcome so he made him the starter for the next game. Without doing all the work the rest of the team had done, he received the same reward. Do you think that was fair? The team DID NOT! The following year my son started high school and his art and music teachers gave him opportunities to shine. He had natural talent in these areas, but so did other students. Was it fair? Perhaps the Gospel message is that instead of measuring our blessings against what others get, we should appreciate the many ways we are blessed.

Have you ever been jealous of someone else's success? Remember, God loves us all... in different ways!

FAIR NOTICE LETTER

Dear Parents / Guardians,

The Holy Spirit Catholic School Division is committed to providing safe learning environments for all students, staff, school visitors and community members. When a student behaves inappropriately, principals use progressive discipline to help a student take responsibility for their actions, change their behavior and learn from their mistakes.

When students' behaviors pose a potential threat to safety or serious harm, the Southwest Alberta Regional Violence Risk Threat Assessment Protocol (VTRA) helps principals take further steps to protect the well-being of students and staff. The protocol helps schools respond quickly to threatening incidents such as: possession of a weapon or a replica weapon, bomb threats or plans, verbal, written or electronic (internet, text) threats to kill or injure oneself or others or other threats of violence, fire setting.

The Southwest Alberta Regional VTRA Protocol outlines how a school responds immediately to threatening behavior. Principals may first bring together a School Threat Assessment Team, which ideally includes the principal / associate principal, a school based counsellor / jurisdictional lead and police of jurisdiction. If the situation is serious the principal may also consult the Superintendent of Schools and call in members of the Community Threat Assessment Team. This community team may include representatives of community agencies who work with us to keep our schools safer such as, but not limited to, local police, children's mental health organizations or Child and Family Services. Parents / guardians will be notified as soon as possible in the Stage I - VTRA Process. If parents / guardians cannot be reached, but a concern for safety still exists due to threatening behavior, the threat assessment may still proceed. Personal information shared throughout this process will respect and balance each individual's right to privacy with the need to ensure the safety of all.

This letter complies with procedure 2 of Administrative Procedure 322: Violence Threat / Risk Assessment (V-TRA) Protocol, which states that parents / guardians will be provided with "fair notice" that each threat will be taken seriously.
