

Principal's Message

As we welcome the month of March, we begin the solemn and meaningful journey of the Lenten Season. For many, Lent holds different significance: a time for reflection on the school year, a period of penitence and selflessness, or a chance to deepen our spiritual connection through prayer and the remembrance of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. It is a time to prepare ourselves spiritually for the joy and hope of Easter. As Jesus reminds us in Matthew 4:4, "Man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God."

We will start this sacred season on March 5th, with our Ash Wednesday Mass, led by Father Kevin. 



Instead of taking classes through the process (one administrator or guidance counselor with each class), we will continue to meet with each student within a class 1:1.

ALBERTA EDUCATION ASSURANCE MEASURE SURVEY INFORMATION FOR PARENTS:

If you are a parent of a grade 10 student at Catholic Central, you will be receiving a survey in the mail from Alberta Education with the option of completing the survey online. We would be grateful if you would take the time to complete the survey as your feedback provides us with direction to better serve our students, your children.

As an annual check-up on the education system, the Assurance Measure Survey provides an opportunity for

Alberta Education and school authorities to ensure that we are equipping students for success.



The Assurance Measure Survey uses a set of indicators. Data on these indicators consists of surveys of students, parents and teachers on various aspects of education quality, student outcomes such as dropout and high school completion rates, and provincial assessments of student learning.

From March 1- March 17, 2025, Alberta Education will be conducting the annual Accountability Pillar Survey.

- Parents of students in grades 4, 7 and 10 will receive a survey from Alberta Education.
- Students in grades 4, 7 and 10 and all teachers will be completing their surveys online at school.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with your school. In addition to English and French, the parent survey is available in Chinese, Punjabi, Arabic, Blackfoot, Dene, Cree, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog and Urdu.

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly. Additionally, please be advised that any question that you answer "I don't know to" will have a negative impact so try to answer to the best of your knowledge.

Survey results will be available to school authorities in May, and will be reported publicly as part of their 3-Year Education Plans and Annual Education Results Reports.

LET GROW EXPERIENCE AT CCH

LET GROW EXPERIENCE AT CCH

If you noticed the trees stationed on both campuses, you may be wondering what they are for. These trees are part of CCH's participation in the "Let Grow Experience." The Let Grow Experience is an opportunity for students to share their accomplishments with their peers. This can be conquering a fear you had or achieving a goal you set! Simply write down what you would like to share with everyone, put it in the box, and Student Council will write it on a leaf and add it to the tree.



The **Let Grow Experience** is a program designed to promote independence and resilience in children and teenagers by encouraging them to take on new responsibilities, try something new on their own, face challenges, and "do the hard things" in order to build resilience. It is based on the idea that modern overprotection can hinder personal growth, and by allowing young people to do more on their own, they develop confidence, problem-solving skills, and self-reliance.

How It Works:

- Participants choose an activity or responsibility they have never done alone before (e.g., walking to school, cooking a meal, running an errand) or something they feel is worth proclaiming (as this year's faith theme encourages us to do) like meeting a new friends, welcoming someone to the CCH community, or simply smiling at someone who needed it.
- They complete the task independently, without excessive supervision or intervention.
- Once students have completed something they feel would help us to grow as a community together, they would come to the office to submit their accomplishment into a "Let Grow Box."
- Students' Council will then take the accomplishment and write them up on paper leaves and attach them to the trees that have been stationed on both campuses.
- The goal is for students to see the tree blossom with new leaves being added every week.
- Similarly, staff will be challenged to engage in the Let Grow Experience and will endeavor to add flower blossoms to the same trees!

Context: The **Let Grow Experience** (https://letgrow.org/program/experience/) is often implemented in schools, youth groups, and families as a way to build resilience and to encourage young people to develop real-world competencies. It is part of a broader movement led by **Let Grow**, an organization founded by Lenore Skenazy, the advocate behind the **Free-Range Kids** movement. Additionally, what a fabulous way to end the Three-Year Faith plan: Pilgrims of Hope and to celebrate the upcoming transition to spring. Just as trees renew in spring, our growth and our faith journey is always unfolding. From now until the end of the school year (midterm of quarter 4), let us recognize this growth in ourselves and in others!


Attention Parents/ Guardians of our Graduates





"This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."

St. John the Baptist 6 B.C.-30 A.D. (Feast Day: June 24)

John the Baptist was born to Zechariah and Elizabeth in the 1st century B.C. We can read the most detailed account of this in the Gospel of Luke, where the angel Gabriel visits them prior to visiting Mary. This has led to the placement of John the Baptist's feast day as six months before Christmas, on June 24. John's public ministry is conducted in the desert, where he is described as a voice 'crying out in the wilderness', wearing clothes made of camel hair and eating locusts and wild honey. He baptizes his followers in the Jordan River, in order to forgive their sins, and calls for repentance in advance of the coming of the Messiah. In this way, we recognize John the Baptist as a prophet of Christ. The Gospels describe John's baptism of Christ:

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens forn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased, (Mark 1: 9-11)

At some point after this, John the Baptist is taken prisoner by Herod, and then beheaded (which is confirmed by the Roman historian Josephus). John the Baptist is the last of the prophets that heralded the coming of Christ, and serves as a model for us in a variety of ways. He speaks of the need for repentance and a healthy understanding of our own sins and flaws. He points to Christ, drawing our attention to him. Finally, his constant witness to Christ, which led him to his death, reminds us to always speak the truth and to put God first in our lives. As we begin Lent this month, may he help us to repent and to prepare the way of the Lord.

The Apostles' Creed

"I believe in the Holy Spirit ... "

The word Spirit is a translation of the Hebrew word ruah, which means breath, air, or wind - these multiple meanings suggest the various ways in which we feel the movement of the Spirit in our lives. We also use many different symbols for the Holy Spirit — fire, wind, doves, water, light — representing the multitude of gifts that we receive in the Spirit. Traditionally, we think of the seven gifts of the Spirit given at Baptism and sealed at confirmation:

- Wisdom the ability to see things from all sides, to see not only the facts but the relationships between them.
- Understanding the ability to see from others perspectives, to accept and care for others.
- Counsel the ability to judge rightly, seeking input from those around us.
- . Knowledge Seeing the world around us as it is.
- Fortitude the strength to follow our conscience in spite of obstacles or difficulties.

- Piety reverence for the value of every thing and person that God
 has greed to see God's holiness reflected in the world around us.
- Fear of the Lord sometimes known as awe and wonder, the ability to be amazed, to realize the powerful presence of God at all times.

Further, we think of the signs of the Spirit — the fruits of the Spirit — as evidence of it's work in our lives. The twelve fruits are kindness, joy, peace, patience, goodness, long-suffering, humility, fidelity/faith, modesty, self-control, chastity, and love.

We can notice that in all of the above, there is relationship — that the Spirit, as a relationship, enlivens, animates, and directs us into right relationship with God and with each other.

As we seek to become *Pilgrims of Hope* this year, let us continue to contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.

March 2, 2025 8th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Gospel Reading: Luke 6:39-45

"Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?" - Luke 6:41

In today's Gospel, Jesus warned his followers about criticizing others. You might be thinking: "If they are doing something wrong, shouldn't we tell them so they can change?" We do have a responsibility to help others do the right thing. But it's often easier to notice when someone else is at fault than to notice when we are at fault. The best thing we can do to help others stay on the right track is to model it in our own lives. Rather than pointing out someone else's faults, we can concentrate on living the most loving way we possibly can. Actions really do speak louder than words!

March 9, 2025 1st Sunday in Lent

Gospel Reading: Luke 4:1-13

"Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus...was led...into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil..." - Luke 4:1-2

As we begin to journey through Lent, we remember that Jesus was called to fast for 40 days before he started his ministry. In this time, Luke tells us that he was tempted by the devil. Will we also be tempted during Lent? Most likely. We will be tempted to stop fasting because it's "too hard." We may be tempted to eat meat on Friday, because "evryone else does." Countless other temptations may arise. In those moments, let us ask the Holy Spirit to fill us with God's grace, that we may overcome the temptation and enter into the spirit of sacrifice to understand how great Jesus' love for us was by following his example.

Gospel Readings

March 16, 2025 2nd Sunday in Lent

Gospel Reading: Luke 9:28b-36

"Join with others in being imitators of me... observe those who thus conduct themselves according to the model you have in us...for many...conduct themselves as enemies of the cross of Christ." - Philippians 3:17-18

We are called to live as Christians, not just when we are at "religious" events at church, but all of the time. This is not easy. We don't want to offend others by telling them they should convert to our religion. But we are called to be imitators of Jesus and how he included everyone, forgave those who were doing wrong, and worked to bring care and hope to the poor, sick, and lonely. St. Paul tried to imitate Christ and asked his readers to be imitators of Christ with him. Still today we are called to do the same.

Who are the role models in my life? Do they lead me to, or away from, Christ? What are some ways I can be a role model to others to encourage them to grow closer to Christ?

March 23, 2025 3rd Sunday in Lent

Gospel Reading: Luke 13:1-9

"...I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish..." - Luke 13:3

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells us twice that if we are not sorry for our sins, we will perish. This can be hard for us to understand. Who wants to worship a God who sends people to hell because they made mistakes and did bad things? But maybe Jesus is not trying to scare us into doing the right things just to avoid punishment, but he is trying to teach us that being sorry for our sins and trying to live in his way is better for everyone, us included. We can all be more peaceful, loving, and full of joy and hope if we treat each other with love and concern. Yet we all get to choose - God won't force us to do the right thing. He does not want us to perish, but every time we do something that is hurtful to someone else, we "die" a little bit more. Lent is a perfect time to "repent" and change our ways so that we can get back on the path of life.

What have I done recently that wasn't good for me or for others that I need to repent of? When have I done something that was good that produced good for others too?

Dear Lord, please help me to search my heart and find the things there that are not pleasing to you. Give me the grace to confess them and change my life, so that I may spend eternity in your loving embrace.

March 30, 2025 4th Sunday in Lent

Gospel Reading: Luke 15:1-3,11-32

*So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him... "This son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!" - Luke 15:20, 24

The Gospel story today is about the Prodigal Son who wasted all of the money his father gave him and almost starved because he didn't have enough left to buy food for himself. It seems like the father would have been mad at him when he came home, but instead the father surprised everyone, even the son, by running out to meet him and welcoming him back by throwing a big party. Jesus wants us to know that God is like that with us. When we do something wrong and admit it, God doesn't punish us or make us feel worse, he rejoices that we want to start all over and try again. He says it's like we were dead but we have come back to life.

What are some things we have done that we regret and need to ask forgiveness for? Who is good at welcoming us and still loving us, even when we make mistakes?
