Graduation 2025 Information

Here is a "Weekend-at-a-Glance" with times and places you need to be.

REGULAR CLASSES until Friday, May 9

REHEARSAL

There are NO SCHEDULED CLASSES for graduates on this day. However, ALL GRADUATES MUST ATTEND a rehearsal on Campus West (in the gym) at 8:15 a.m. We will be doing the following:

1. running through all times and details,
2. rehearsing the candle lighting ceremony, the handing over of the graduation certificate, and the grand march,
3. distributing grad downs, stoles, caps, tassels, and pins, and
4. taking a grad class photo around 10:00 AM

- All speakers/ offertory for Mass and speakers for the Convocation Ceremonies go to the visitLethbridge.com Arena to practice at 11:00 AM

GRADUATION MASS

- Friday, May 9, 7:00 PM at the Arena
- Grads arrive at 6:15 PM through the "Player's Entrance" and line up alphabetically in the lower concourse.
- Grads wear their gowns and stoles, but no caps/ tassels over their clothes (regular, "Sunday best" clothes)
- Cell phones should be left with a family member.
- No gum, coffees/ teas/ pop, etc

CONVOCATION

- The Ceremonies (referred to as the Convocation) is the academic celebration where students receive their certificates.
- Saturday, May 10, 9:00 AM at the Arena
- Grads arrive at 8:15 AM to the lower concourse (you will arrive through the "Player's Entrance" and onto the lower concourse) and line up alphabetically.

- Grads will need their gowns, stoles, caps with tassels (on the right side of your face), and grad pin over your clothes (regular, dress up clothes)
- Cell phones should be left with a family member.
- No gum, coffees/ teas/ pop, etc.
- Grads should write their names in their caps – you keep these and the tassels.
- At the conclusion of the ceremonies, gowns and stoles will need to be returned behind the stage at the Enmax.

GRAND MARCH

- The Grad Grand March is the showcase of finery (grad dresses, suits, tuxedos, formal wear, ethnic or traditional wear, etc.).
- Saturday, May 10, 7:00 PM at the Arena.
- Grads arrive at 6:15 PM to the lower concourse (you will arrive through the "Players Entrance" and onto the lower concourse and line up by your Grand March groupings (not in alphabetical order).
- Cell phones should be left with a family member.
- No gum, coffees/ teas/ pop, etc.

DANCE

- The dance follows immediately after the "Grad Class of 2025" has been announced.
- Please pre-arrange parent/ guardian, special guest, other family members, etc. dances. and a "photographer" prior to the dance. We must keep at a 2:1 ratio of 2 guests per graduate on the dance floor at a time.
- When your guest is coming to the floor, do not stop at the boards, keep moving toward the stage so as to avoid a bottle-neck.
- There will be multiple areas set up for photo opportunities so there is no need to crowd the floor.

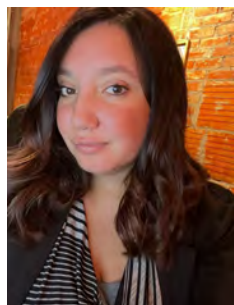
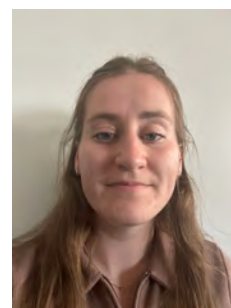

Pilgrims of Hope

"It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not fail you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed."
— Deuteronomy 31:8

St. Joan of Arc 1412-1431 (Feast Day: May 30)

St. Joan of Arc is a heroine of France and a Catholic saint, and is often referenced in books, television, movies, and songs. A peasant girl born in the east of what is today France, she was raised in a religious family, and at the age of 12, had a vision from God. These visions continued through her teenage years. In them, an angel told her to lead the French in battles against the British, who controlled the land at this time, and to restore the son of the King, Charles, to the throne. Many people did not believe her. Over time, however, her visions and predictions continued to come true, which led those around her to follow her. Eventually, she traveled in disguise to Charles, who gave her control of an army. This army had a number of successes against the British forces, and eventually Charles did become king.

In 1430, while attacking another British force, Joan was captured. The British put her on trial, accusing her of witchcraft and heresy. There was nothing to these charges, but she was found guilty regardless, and was martyred by burning at the stake in 1431. She is often called upon by those who are seeking to accomplish very challenging tasks, and by soldiers.

The Apostles' Creed

"the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins..."

To believe in the communion of saints is really in a sense an expansion of our belief in the holy catholic Church. We proclaim in this line our belief that we need one another in the Church as part of our path to salvation. We know that communion means oneness, and in this instance the lower-case saints refers not solely to those who have been canonized, but all who are amongst the holy people of God.

We know (often all too well) that we are sinners in need of God's grace. The good news that we have in our faith is that God freely distributes to us this grace and forgives our sins. We are called nonetheless to continual conversion, and to extend that same grace of forgiveness to those around us. In this, we see the restoration of the relationships that we have with one another, and with God.

In his writings, Paul often refers to or greets his readers as saints. So in this, we see the holiness that surrounds us here on earth, actively working together to support one another as we strive towards heaven.

As we seek to become Pilgrims of Hope this year, let us continue to contemplate the Creed, and how our proclamation of the Creed unites us to one another and to all Christians through time and space.

May 4, 2025

3rd Sunday of Easter

Gospel Reading: John 21:1-19

"We gave you strict orders, did we not, to stop teaching in that name?... We must obey God rather than men...we are witnesses of these things, as is the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him." — Acts 5:28-29, 32

When the disciples realized Jesus had risen from the dead, they couldn't help but tell everyone they met about him. They were ordered to stop talking about him but they just couldn't — they were willing to sacrifice everything to teach people about Jesus. It's hard to believe that these are the same disciples who were in the upper room afraid for their lives a few days earlier. What changed them? The Holy Spirit did.

Where do we stand with Jesus? Are we hiding in the upper room, hoping no one will find out that we follow him, or are we willing to accept the gift of the Holy Spirit, which gives us the grace and courage to share him with the world?

How do I feel about sharing my faith in Jesus with others?

4th Sunday of Easter

Gospel Reading: John 10:27-30

"My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me." — John 10:27

The sounds of train whistles, fire engine or ambulance sirens, and dangerous weather alerts are meant to protect us from harm. In our Gospel today, we learn that Jesus protects us, too. He calls us his sheep and wants us to know that like a good shepherd who protects his sheep away from danger, Jesus will keep us safe. If we listen, we will come to love and follow him, and he will protect us. If we ignore the warning of a train whistle, refuse to move out of the way of a speeding ambulance, or fail to go to a shelter in dangerous weather, we could be badly hurt or even die. We listen to these things to help us stay safe. In the same way, if we know Jesus' voice and obey it, we will stay on the right track. Jesus wants to protect us; but first, we must listen!

5th Sunday of Easter

Gospel Reading: John 13:31-33a, 34-35

"As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." — John 13:34

Suppose company is coming to your house for dinner and you want to make a special meal. You might look up a recipe on the internet, then go to the grocery store and get all the ingredients. Finally, you start the process of cooking. As you read the recipe you see words like "blanch," "reduce," "sear," and you find yourself totally confused! But then, you notice that there is an online video that accompanies the recipe. And as you watch it, presto, these unfamiliar terms make sense. We learn best when someone shows us, don't we?

Jesus knew it wasn't enough to tell us how to love; he came and demonstrated it for us. It would be hard to miss; Jesus always put the needs of others first. In today's Gospel, he challenges us to imitate him by loving each other in the same way.

What can we do today to ease the suffering of someone who needs to be loved?



Prayer:

Dear Lord, give us the desire to love others with the same love you showed us. Help us to be centered less on ourselves and more on the needs of the poor and suffering.

May 25, 2025

6th Sunday of Easter

Gospel Reading: John 14:23-29

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you. Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid." — John 14:27

What does the world say will bring us peace? Being popular at school? Winning at video games? Making a sports team? Being the star in a play? For parents, it might be a promotion at work, an exotic vacation, having plenty of money to invest so it will make even more money for us, or perhaps good health. All these things can give us peace, but only for a while. There will always be something new that we need or desire. Even our health will only last for a limited time, since we will all eventually die.

Jesus offers us a different kind of peace; one that will never end. It is the peace of heaven, where we will be surrounded by unconditional love and there will be no more tears or suffering.

Dear Lord, we so desire the lasting peace you promise. Please help us to set our sights on heaven instead of on the provisions of this world. Help us obey you in all things.

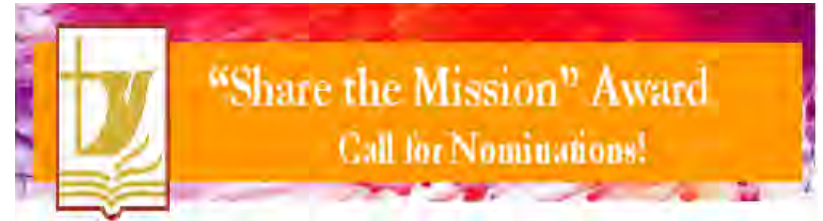
